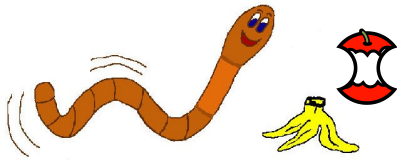

Worms Eat My Garbage

Will County is proud to offer vermicomposting (worm) bins to teachers. Since Will County created this grant program in September, we have provided seven bins to various classrooms ranging from preschool to junior high.

Worms will break down vegetable and fruit scraps into a fine, nutrient rich fertilizer that can be used in gardens and house plants. Students will delight in seeing the remains of their apples and carrot sticks “disappear” as they decompose and the red wigglers devour them!

Although the original deadline (December) for applying for the bin has passed, we are happy to announce that we are able to provide bins until February 1, 2012. The application can be found at www.willcountygrown.com. Scroll to the middle of the home page and click on the green bin.

The grant consists of personal delivery and brief instruction on:

- One ready-to-start vermicomposting bin
- Red wiggler worms and bin bedding
- Vermicomposting book

All that we require is that participating teachers complete two questionnaires and evaluations during the program.

For the remainder of this school year, we will only be able to provide one worm bin per school. But for those schools with active worm bins, we would encourage you to consider splitting your population of worms with another teacher and creating a new bin.

Earth Flag Schools Are Busy!

Planting: Club members of the Horticulture/Garden Club have been busy planting native species not only on the school property but throughout the Park District to attract butterflies.

Litter Reduction: Students recovered litter from the school grounds and created a display demonstrating how the litter could have been recycled or reused.

Endangered animals: In addition, club members have used recyclable materials to create replicas of endangered animals or species. These replicas were on display at the school for all students to see.

Recycling: Club sponsor, Patricia Pfeiffer, reports that the school also recycles ink and laser cartridges, cell phones, and plastic containers.

Under the leadership of teacher Jenifer Garlitz, the Environmental Club has embarked on a number of new projects.

Vermicomposting: Through the Will County grant program, the club members received their worm bin and started adding food scraps to make nutrient-rich compost. The worm castings were later added to their school gardening project as natural fertilizer.

Gardening: The club constructed cold-frame gardens (mini-greenhouses). Last spring they prepared the soil and planted the seeds. By the end of the school year, they were able to harvest spinach and radishes that enthusiastic members shared in a veggie feast!

Paperless Days: The school building leadership team voted this fall to have paperless Wednesdays throughout the school to cut down on paper use. As a school with an enrollment of over 900 students and over 75 staff members, the year-end analysis should reveal some serious paper reduction. We know they will be saving trees!

Keep Electronics out of the Garbage!

Unfortunately, 90% of outdated electronics are thrown out with the garbage, where they can have a devastating impact on the environment. The good news is that as of January 1, 2012, the state of Illinois has prohibited many electronic from being placed in the landfills. There are recycling programs that carefully separate the good from the bad and bundle them for destruction or reuse.

Will County has been proactive in preparing for this ban by working with municipalities and townships since 2007 to offer permanent electronic recycling drop-off sites across the county for the convenience of residents. The county currently operates 13 permanent electronic recycling sites and works closely with Vintage Tech Recyclers in Romeoville to provide this service at no cost to taxpayers.

This public-private partnership between Will County and Vintage Tech is the first of its kind in the nation that allows for FREE front door pick-up of electronic recycling items.

This program was made possible by the innovative arrangements that Vintage Tech has made with industry manufacturers and has no added cost to local taxpayers.
