Plastic Bag Recycling Challenge Winners!

Schools come in all shapes and sizes. In terms of the 2012-2013 Plastic Bag Recycling Challenge, St. Mary Nativity School in Joliet qualifies as the "Little School That Could." With the smallest student population (only 178 pupils), St. Mary Nativity School qualified to win the per-capita based contest this May. The school collected just under 76,000 plastic bags, averaging 426 bags per student. As the winner of the competition, the school was awarded a TREX bench made from recycled plastic bags.

Twenty-seven schools from Will County chose to participate in this year's competition. Between October and April, all schools together collected over 726,000 bags to be recycled into TREX plastic lumber.

St. Mary Nativity School had 24 dedicated members in the 5th grade Team Green. The team members stressed that although members of the church parish also donated bags to the collection, it was the students, K-8, who were instrumental in the success of their collection.

Carole Frano, Team Green's teacher, reported that the younger students from the first floor learned that if they made the somewhat intimidating walk upstairs to deposit bags in the upper grade collection box, they would be rewarded with a recycling sticker.

Team Green students loaded Ms. Frano's car with filled collection bags before she made her twice-weekly trip to Wal-Mart to deliver the plastic.

Please do not lose the message that initially we all need to reduce our consumption of plastic bags and to use reusable cloth bags on a regular basis. Recycling of plastic bags is the next best solution for any bags that do happen to creep into our lives.

This Class Has Worms!

Plainfield Central High School students take the vermicomposting experience many steps further.

Plainfield Central High School was one of 17 recipients of a vermicomposting bin during the 2012-2013 school year. Students in Joseph Kamper's science classes quickly learned that the red wiggler worms inhabiting the bin would anxiously devour organic food scraps and turn them into nutrient-rich fertilizer. The lesson didn't end there, however.

Students kept decomposition logs and measured temperature levels in the bin. Under Mr. Kamper's instruction, samples of the soil were observed under dissection scopes and microscopes to observe the diversity of decomposers. Students created drawings of the organisms from the protist and animal kingdoms.

The class noticed that seeds from food scraps would occasionally germinate within the bin. These seedlings were transferred to reused plastic bottle planters using the rich compost from the bin.

Mr. Kamper relates that the classroom activities generated by the vermicomposting bin encompass a variety of scientific topics from chemistry decomposition to biological ecosystems to food chains.

When asked if he had encountered any problems with the bin, Mr. Kamper answered, "No problems! The worms have been happy ever since they got here. They are well fed and cared for by the students."

Complete 4 Earth Tasks:

Recycle Paper and one additional material (ink cartridges, cans, bottles, plastic bags, etc.)

Use Both Sides of photocopies or loose leaf paper; institute a double-sided policy.

Invite Will County to your school for a presentation to one grade level or environmental group.

- Students and faculty become environmental ambassadors to the remainder of the school.
- Follow-up report submitted to Will County related to information presented.

Perform Two Activities of Your Choice involving one grade level or school club by May 1, 2014.

- Host a collection event to save landfill space and give items a new purpose (shoes, clothing, books, etc.)
- Start an environmental club (meet at least monthly to discuss environmental topics);
- Compost organic food scraps at school (using outdoor compost bin or classroom vermi-composting bin);
- Perform at least 2 waste-free lunch days during the school year;
- Host a recycled art fair to showcase student projects;
- Join the TREX Plastic Bag Recycling Challenge (application on *willcountygreen.com* site)
- Become a Lights4Learning school;

Other

- Entire school uses natural lighting one hour a month, eliminating overhead lights (Earth Hour);
- Join Will County's Better Buildings Challenge in partnership with the Department of Energy;

Presentations will be a minimum of 30 minutes and a maximum of 45 minutes. If multiple presentations are in the same day, the representative will need 15 minutes between classes for set-up/moving. Smaller groups are far more effective than large assemblies. We prefer to give several presentations in a school to groups with fewer than 40 students. In some buildings, this can mean that the presentations will be spread over two days.

During the 2013-2014 school year, the presentations will focus on energy conservation and alternate forms of energy, in addition to recycling.
